
CALL TO ORDER: 5:30 p.m.

ROLL CALL: City Commissioners present: Michael J. Winters, Bill Bronson, Fred Burow, Bob Jones, and Bob Kelly.

STAFF PRESENT: Deputy City Manager; Directors of Park and Recreation, and Planning and Community Development; Deputy Planning Director; City Engineer; Interim City Attorney; Fire Chief; Police Chief; and the Deputy City Clerk.

1. POLICE, FIRE, EMS UPDATES

Police Chief Dave Bowen provided a PowerPoint presentation on the Great Falls Police Department (GFPD) response to the local issues of drugs, child abuse, and school safety.



Drugs

- Multi-Agency effort to fight illegal drugs
- Includes: GFPD, CCSO, ATF, DEA, HSI, Border Patrol, MANG – Intel Analyst
- Federally funded under the HIDTA program (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas). Direction of the Office of National Drug Control Policy.






Drugs

- Member since 2003, revitalized the program and reorganized under Russell Country Drug Task Force (RCDTF).
- reorganized under Russeil
 Country Drug Task Force
 (RCDTF).

 Detectives lab certified to
 dismantle/package labs.
 Cross deputized for
 operations in the county.
- DDACTS (Data Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety).
- DRE certified officers (Drug Recognition Experts).





Child Abuse



In Cascade County alone, there was 200 child abuse and neglect cases in 2012.

GFPD Response

- Development of Special Victims Unit
 - 1 Detective devoted to working child sex and abuse cases – carries a heavy caseload (up to 30).
 - 1 Detective working ICAC part time. (Internet Crimes Against Children) Over 200 active cases to be worked in Gt. Falls if caseload permitted.
 - 1 Detective tracking Sexual/Violent offenders –
 553 offenders in Great Falls (141 –sex offenders,
 401 violent offenders).
 - Need for expansion in this unit at least 1 more.

GFPD Response

- Members of the following Boards:
 - MDT (Multi Disciplinary Team) meet weekly
 - Child Protection Team Staff DFS cases
 - Child Evaluation Center Location for child victims of abuse to be evaluated (90 victims helped last year).
 - Early Childhood Coalition (211 Mt/Bridge to Benefits information to provide to 1st Responders).
- Reviewing child homicides to determine if there are any recurring themes for early detection.
- Community Awareness and early reporting.

School Safety



GFPD Response

School Resource Officers

- Engaged with teachers/students/parents alerted to early warning signs (Help in conducting threat assessments).
- Rearranged schedule to maximize time at the schools.
- Provide safety training and work with staff on lock down drills/shelter in place.
- Utilize technology to include video surveillance to monitor behavior/activity.

GFPD Response

Training

- Active shooter training with our officers conducted on site at local schools. 3 members of dept. are instructors and recognized state wide.
- Course scheduled for next week.
- Dispatch staff recently completed 3 day training course on active shooter incidents.
- SRO's recently attended FBI sponsored Assessing & Managing Threats of School Violence.
- Joint training with the school district Jan. 2013
- Mass casualty exercise planned for summer 2013.

GFPD Response

- Police administrators are members of local mental health committees that meet regularly. The officers provide input and discussion about mental health issues that can affect the community.
- Community Priority on families and the role of the father.
 - Early reporting of suspicious behavior.

GFPD Response - HRU

- 22 volunteers from within the PD and FD
- Four distinct groups –
 (4) Snipers
 - (12) Entry
- (3) Negotiators
- (2) Medical
- (1) Tactical Commander
- Team meets once a month for training (108 hours a year)

- · High Risk Warrant Service
- Barricaded Suspects
- Terrorism Incidents
- Drug Search Entries

- Hostage Situations

HRU

- Annual budget of approx. \$15,000
- Qualified on following: handguns shotguns rifles
 37mm & 40mm chemical munition





HRU

- State certified <u>Level 1</u>
 <u>Team</u> able to respond to incidents ranging from high risk warrant service to hostage rescue
- This is the highest certification level



HRU

- Only the Chief of Police or designated representative can authorize mobilizations
- Risk Analysis/Assessment is utilized to assist officer or shift commander in making recommendation to Chief of Police
- There were 8 activations in 2012

HRU

- 01-25-12 High Risk Warrant Service Assault with Weapon
- 02-28-12 Barricaded Suspect Assault with Weapon
- 03-02-12 Barricaded Suspect Shot at GFPD Officers
- 05-28-12 High Risk Warrant Service Assault with Weapon
- 10-07-12 High Risk Warrant Service Narcotics/Meth
- 10-11-12 Barricaded Suspect Assault with a Weapon
- 11-01-12 Attempted Homicide on LE Pipe Bombs
- 11-14-12 High Risk Warrant Service Narcotics

Chief Bowen played a video clip of Jessica Bray, whose daughter was the victim of a homicide from her boyfriend. The educational clip is being used statewide.

Chief Bowen reported the Police Department and Fire Department will be working together on a mass casualty exercise planned for the summer of 2013.

Fire Chief Randy McCamley noted Fire Rescue EMS provides support for law enforcement in such events. However, there are challenges when trying to rescue people when there is an active shooter.

Chief Bowen noted that Chief McCamley obtained the 911 tape from the Aurora, Colorado shooting to identify what can be done between the two agencies to provide better response.

There was discussion on the importance of letting the community know how both agencies are strategizing a response to a mass casualty event.

2. <u>COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT RECOMMENDATIONS</u>

Deputy Planning Director Wendy Thomas provided a PowerPoint presentation on CDBG and HOME 2013/2014 funding recommendations of the Community Development Council (CDC).
