1. **PUBLIC COMMENT**

2. <u>CITY UPDATE – FIRE DEPARTMENT</u>

Fire Chief Randy McCamley introduced Assistant Fire Chief Steve Hester, Operations Division, and Fire Marshal Dirk Johnson, Fire Prevention Education Enforcement Division.

Fire Marshal Johnson and Assistant Fire Chief Hester provided and discussed a PowerPoint Fire Department update presentation.

- Goals;

 - Prevent fires, Ensure Fire Protection System are Reliable
 - Protect the Means of Egress to Allow for Occupant Escape
- This work is the first in the fire protection seauence.
 - No fires mean no response by firefighters
 - Fires are smaller held in check or extinguished
 - Occupants are warned early and escape safely
- Firefighter risk is lower when there is a fire
 Fire Investigation determine origin and cause and prosecute arson

Fire Protection/Prevention

- How are we doing?
 - Inspections focus more in line with the Bureau's goals
 - 2400 inspections conducted annually
 - All new construction and large renovation in compliance with current fire code
 - Fire alarm, and fire suppression system oversight has been overwhelming
 - New Deputy Fire Marshal

- Fire Marshal Forward
- working to bring existing facilities up to code and
- ensure new facilities are built to code
- ensure proper inspection and maintenance of fire protection systems



GFFR Operations Forward

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Fire Marshall Johnson noted the current Fire Prevention Bureau priority is getting fire code violations up to code.

Fire Marshall Johnson agreed to join Mayor Winters on the KNIX radio program the following Tuesday, 8:30 a.m. to discuss fire safety.

City Manager Greg Doyon discussed City expansion and the possibility that impact may exceed the capability of current resources. He also discussed the importance of moving development forward in a smart, strategic way.

Assistant Chief Hester noted in 1988 there were 68 firefighters; that number was later reduced to 60. No additional firefighters have been added to date.

Manager Doyon discussed the potential cost of a new fire station, including staffing and one fire truck.

The consensus of the Commission was to direct staff to explore the scope of a feasibility study that would provide residents a comprehensive look at future needs based on growth, current assets and operations, and current personnel, and provide that information to the Commission for consideration.

Mayor Winters believes a fire academy would provide residents a view of the needs of the Fire Department.

Chief McCamley believes the Fire Department reflects the community's investment in public safety. He noted the four existing fire stations were built in 1969. At the time, the City was approximately 16 square miles; it has grown about 10 square miles since that time. He discussed the current number of firefighters and the current number of calls for service. He also discussed the City's ISO rating.

The Commission expressed appreciation to Chief McCamley for his service to the City.

City Manager Greg Doyon provided and discussed a handout Master Work Session Topic List.

Commissioner Kelly suggested that an airport representative be scheduled for a future Work Session presentation.
