Building a Stronger Montana For Tomorrow



MTNG Youth ChalleNGe Academy serves youth, 16-18 years of age who are at risk of not A C A D E M y graduating high school. During an intensive 5 and 1/2 month residential program followed by a 12 month mentoring program, Youth ChalleNGe NWAC provides the tools & experiences to graduate as productive, employable, law-abiding, and taxpaving citizens. The program conducted 40 classes

& graduated over 3,000 cadets since its inception in 1999. The Academy's 80% Overall HiSet/GED success rate exceeds the national average. Over 80% of students maintain a longterm placement rate four years after graduation. Academy staff are personally involved in assisting cadets to develop their Post-Residential Action Plans to reinforce commitment to long-term success.

Twenty-two graduates returned to high school after completing ChalleNGe in Class 40. Twelve graduates went to Job Corps or Adult Education, and 56 graduates went on to college, the workforce, or military service.

More than 205,162 hours of community service has been performed by Academy cadets since program inception with a value of \$1,296,225 (Based on current federal minimum wage rate).

STARBASE Montana has two locations, one in Helena at Fort Harrison and the other at the 120th

Airlift Wing in Great Falls. STARBASE offers a premier educational program that provides a challenging "hands-on. minds-on" learning experience for elementary school children to raise their interest and improve knowledge and skills with emphasis in Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM). STARBASE is one of the few programs in the United States that teaches CAD/3D Engineering Design to elementary aged students. STARBASE exposes students and teachers to real world applications of math and science through inquiry based learning, simulations and experiments using technology applications while complimented with the positive role models found on military bases and communities. A total of 10,920 students have attended Helena since the Fall of 2007 from Helena, East Helena, Lincoln, Montana City. Additionally, 7,457 students have attended Great Falls since inception in the Spring of 2012 from Great Falls, Cascade. Centerville, Highwood, Augusta, Fort Shaw, Vaughn, Our Lady of Lourdes, Holy Spirit, Five Falls and Foothills Christian Elementary Schools and the Montana School for the Deaf and Blind. In FY19 the STARBASE team hosted STEM Summer camps for children of military families at both sites. In addition, the team took their STEM camp on the road to the Rocky Boy, Browning and Ronan communities. This program is staffed by 2 State employees and 6 contract employees from Helena & Great Falls School Districts. FY19 saw \$680K education dollars to Montanal



Americans Protecting America



The Montana National Guard (MTNG) is a unique, community-based organization that consists of over 3,700 Citizen-Soldiers & Airmen authorized to units in over 20 communities. The Guard is financially supported in large through federal funding in the form of military pay and allowances, procurements of goods

& services, and capital investments in equipment & infrastructure. Federal funding for Guard activities bolsters the state economy as the revenue is turned over several times in countless business segments of local communities.



Montana Army National Guard (MTARNG) deployed 3,999 Montana Citizen Soldiers in support of all major overseas contingency operations since 2001. In 2019, approximately 375 Soldiers were deployed overseas. On the home front, the MTNG Defensive Cyber Operation Element was activated in

support of state cyber operations. Throughout 2019 and into 2020, the MTARNG continued enhancing unit readiness levels and equipment upgrades to better serve Montanans when called upon to support civil and state authorities if, and when, needed. ARNG Soldiers originate from 19 states and 189 communities within Montana, travelling over 220,000 miles each month to attend their training assemblies.



Montana Air National Guard (MTANG) deployed 130 Airmen to over 10 countries as well as 120 Airmen and 4 C-130s to Kuwait in support of Operation DESERT SHIELD. During 2019, the 120th performed airlift operations around the world flying 2,582 hours, 1,335 sorties, trans-

porting 18,481 passengers, 264 jumpers and moving 5,479 tons of cargo. In addition, 70 MTANG Airmen supported Active Duty operations via MPA tours at home & abroad for a total of 11,983 days.

The 219th RED HORSE executed an assault landing strip improvement project at Camp Guernsey, WY. Simultaneously, the unit constructed an equipment storage facility on Malmstrom AFB. The unit supported operations in the United Kingdom, two joint Air/Army NG sling load training events, and an airfield pavement evaluation of the Lewistown Municipal Airport.

** In 2019, the MTNG was able to secure a comprehensive 100% tuition waiver program for all Montana National Guard men and women that attend a Montana institute of higher education.**

Emergency Response & Civil Support

Montanans Serving Montana

The Montana Army National Guard Aviation conducted 5 Search and Rescue missions during 2019.

The 83rd Civil Support Team (CST) provides support to HAZMAT teams and agencies throughout Montana to identify and handle unknown chemical agents, white powder incidents and any other potential chemical, biological or radiological scenarios. During 2019 the CST has responded to 4 incidents & 20 requests for assistance with threat reduction at large events. In 2019 the CST assisted with security for elected officials, to include POTUS and multiple large events.

The 120th AW Fire Department provides all fire & emergency services at the Great Falls International Airport. They are an integral part of the Great Falls Incident Response Force through mutual aid agreements and along with city & county responders, supported multiple events and 4 fire response incidents throughout 2019.

The MTANG trained nearly 40 personnel for fire fighting II certification in preparation for the 2019 wild fire season with over 130 personnel ready to respond.

The MTNG planned and conducted multi-agency rehearsals in preparation for winter storm response and wildland fire support for the state of Montana that strengthened cooperation and enhanced relationships with our local, state, and federal emergency response partners.

Disaster and Emergency Services



Disaster & Emergency Services

The Montana Division of Disaster and Emergency Services (MT DES) exists to provide prompt and timely response to disasters, ensure that preparation of the state is adequate to deal with disasters, and preserve lives and property of the people of Montana

to the fullest extent possible. Our mission is to lead a comprehensive emergency management program to prepare for, respond to, recover from, and mitigate disasters. Our strategic goals are:

Goal 1. Build a Culture of Preparedness

Goal 2. Ready the State for Disaster

Goal 3. Reduce Complexity

Goal 4. Cultivate Leadership

Funding for Counties and Tribes

Between October 1, 2014 and September 30, 2019 the Montana Disaster & Emergency Services Division administered over \$51 million in mitigation, preparedness, and disaster funding that touched every county and tribe in the state.

Mitigation is the effort to reduce the impacts disasters have on people and communities. The National Institute of Building and Sciences found that for every \$1 dollar invested in mitigation saves taxpayers an average of \$6 in future spending. The Pew Charitable Trust reports that the return on investment for flood-related mitigation in Montana is \$6.36 for every \$1 invested. Mitigation is key to becoming less dependent on state and federal disaster funding.

Preparedness funding helps communities develop and sustain local disaster and emergency services programs to ensure all levels of government are prepared for response, and recover from, disasters. Funding may be used to purchase equipment or services that enhance local capabilities to effectively respond to events, ultimately saving lives and reducing impact to property, as well as updating plans and conducting exercises and training.

Disaster funding supports communities as they recover from a state or federally declared disaster. Depending on the magnitude of the event, communities may be eligible for financial assistance for debris removal, life-saving emergency protective measures, and restoring public infrastructure.

Montana Military Family Relief Fund

The Montana Military Family Relief Fund (MMFRF), signed into law in 2007, provides monetary grants to families of Montana Guard & Reserve who, on or after April 28, 2007, are called to active duty for federal service in support of a contingency operation.

MMFRF grants are intended to help Montana families defray the costs of food, housing, utilities, medical services, and other expenses that become difficult to afford when a wage earner has temporarily left civilian employment and is placed on federal active duty.

During FY19 the department paid grants to military families totaling \$54,750.

Afontana - Kyrgynton

State Partnership Program

The Montana-Kyrgyz Republic State Partnership Program (SPP) is a federally-funded joint initiative between Kyrgyz Republic, the Depart-

ment of State, DoD and Montana. SPP directly supports the interests of the United States by engaging partner nations through military and civilian contacts at all levels. The effectiveness of the program lies in its ability to leverage the unique abilities and connections of Montana's Citizen Soldiers. All activities are coordinated through the U.S. Ambassador and DoD.

International level issues have temporarily limited activity for Senior Leader Visits (SLV). In August FY 19, however, 3 senior Kyrgyzstan political leaders visited Montana. We anticipate activity to increase in FY20 and further improve in the coming years.
