Over the past two years, GFFR has continued to evolve in how we provide all hazards emergency services. Through careful adjustments to our response model, we have reduced call volume by prioritizing critical life-safety incidents and partnering with allied agencies better positioned to handle non-emergent needs. These changes ensure that when the seconds matter most, our firefighters are ready and able to respond.

Our commitment to community engagement has also deepened. We've expanded efforts to connect through education on fire and life safety, and by continuing to build partnerships that make our community stronger and safer. These relationships are the heart of who we are as a department.

This period has also brought challenges. The failure of a public safety levy and bond was disappointing, as those initiatives represented much-needed investments in the future of our service. 



Budget Definitions

Internal Services - Costs of services provided by another City department (i.e. accounting, equipment maintenance, or human resources).

Debt Services - The repayment of 's borrowed money, with interest, on a payment schedule.










Total Incidents 2020-2024








WHY the Decrease?

City Ordinance designates GFFR to provide oversite of EMS in the City. The City contracts with Great Falls Emergency Services (GFES) to be the primary agency to transport patients from the incident location to the hospitals.

GFFR transporting patients is dependent on the capacity of GFES staffing and their available responding units. GFFR and Dispatch are notified of GFES' available responding units daily. GFFR will provide or assist with patient transport when GFES units are otherwise committed.

GFFR focuses its response on the most critical, life-threatening emergencies, especially when resources are limited. By prioritizing and/or redirecting non-emergency calls to the appropriate partners, we ensure our crews are available to respond quickly when lives are at risk. If non-emergency calls are not handled properly, they can tie up units and delay response to life threatening emergencies. Thanks to strong coordination efforts, the need for GFFR to provide patient transport decreased in 2024.







All Montana ExpoPark food vendors passed the State's new fire code requirements with 100% compliance



In 2023, the State of Montana adopted the 2021 International Fire Code (IFC), which introduced new safety requirements for mobile food preparation vehicles under Section 319. This section references the 2021 NFPA 96 Standard focusing on mobile food vendors and temporary cooking operations.

While these changes created some challenges adjusting to the State's new requirements, GFFR worked closely with vendors by providing checklists, guidance and resources to make compliance achievable.

Thanks to these partnerships, participating vendors successfully met the code safety requirements ensuring safer operations for both operators and the public.

Fire Prevention Bureau

Executive Fire Officer Graduate, Assistant Chief McIntosh

Assistant Chief of Prevention, Michael McIntosh joined only 16 other firefighters as a graduate of the Executive Fire Officer Program in 2024.

The EFO Program has an extensive application process and takes 2 (up to 4) years to complete.



The EFO Program is structured to empower executive officers to develop, maintain and expand their abilities to apply effective communication skills, strategically plan for a prepared and safer community, prioritize personal and organizational growth, exercise leadership to meet the challenges of the department and community and develop, evaluate and implement public policies.

Arson Investigation Training

GFFR hosted the Montana Chapter of the International Association of Arson Investigators annual training during May of 2024. Attendees included law enforcement, fire service investigators and private insurance investigators.





Building to Burn


GFFR was grateful to Groupe ADF Inc. and Great Falls College MSU for jointly working with us to build two reusable burn cells that GFFR will use for educational demonstrations and fire investigation training! The burn cells were completed and delivered in April of 2024.

Groupe ADF Inc. designed the plans with GFFR's vision, and Great Falls College MSU welding students made the vision come to life.

Planning, Preparedness and Partnerships

Great Falls Fire Rescue and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) of Region 8 conducted a hazardous material tabletop exercise that focused on identifying strengths and areas for improvement when responding to (2) chemical release events in Great Falls.

Over 40 people representing 24 organizations attended and discussed capabilities including: Operational Coordination; Operational Communications; Public Information and Warning; Environmental Response/ Health & Safety; and Planning. Goals of the exercise were to increase awareness of local responsibilities and support activities in response to a hazmat incident and identify potential weaknesses in plans and procedures during a high stress event.

Grants and Donations

GFFR Receives Assistance to Firefighters Grant Award

March 2023, GFFR received notification from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) that they were awarded \$990,500.00 to purchase an aerial apparatus replacing GFFR's 96' Quint Aerial through their Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) submission. City Commission voted to support GFFR applying for the AFG grant and approved funding for the 10% match and remaining cost of purchasing the new aerial apparatus.

Great Falls Fire Rescue's new aerial was delivered during October of 2023, where it underwent a post-delivery inspection and crews completed manufacturer training. October 26th, 2023, the 23' Pierce Enforcer Ascendant was put into front line service. The 96' Quint was retired, no longer used for emergency response.

Railcar Donation Enhances Readiness



August of 2024, GFFR was donated a railcar training prop for our firefighters for enhanced training for high/low pressure ruptures or leaks, confinement exercises and plenty of other complex scenario based rail incidents.



Community contributors included Jimmy Flipowicz of Steel Etc., M&D Construction, Maxim Crane, Sletten Construction and BNSF for their help moving and securing the prop at GFFR's Training Center.

Leary Foundation Grant Awarded to GFFR

After years of unsuccessful funding attempts, GFFR was awarded the 2024 Leary Foundation Grant. The \$1200 grant funded a gear dryer to improve efficiency, extend the life of protective gear, and reduce maintenance.

Previously, gear was dried by fans blowing on gear hanging on pipes in the basement of Station 1 - a slow process that left firefighters relying on backup gear with lower safety standards. The new dryer improves response readiness and better protects GFFR's firefighters from harmful contaminants.



Community Focused, Professionally Driven

COMPANY OFFICER ACADEMY

2023 was the first year of GFFR held their Company Officer Academy. This academy focuses not only on emergency response management but organizational leadership as well.

GFFR is always looking for ways to develop our members to provide the highest level of community service.





CITIZENS ACADEMIES

GFFR's Citizen's Academy offers community members the chance to gain first hand knowledge and experience of the services we provide to our community.

For 6 weeks, participants learned about topics ranging from fire suppression to technical rescues.



TRAINING TOGETHER

Members of area fire departments train with GFFR focusing on risk management, Maydays and rapid intervention to improve skills as well as interoperability among multiple departments.





LEADERSHIP TRAINING

GFFR members are offered the opportunity to participate in the City of Great Falls Leadership Training Program.

Engineer Nolan Taylor was GFFR's 2024 participant who completed the multiple week training with other emerging leaders throughout the City's Departments.

Perspective on Public Safety Levy & Bond

In November, 2023, Great Falls voters declined to pass both the operating levy and capital bond of the proposed Public Safety package, aimed at funding fire, police, legal and court services.



After months of education and outreach, majority of Great Falls voters chose to oppose the proposed 2023 Public Safety Levy and Bond that would have provided funding needed to increase and maintain safety in Great Falls.

For GFFR, the Public Safety Levy would have funded 32 firefighters, 1 fire prevention staff member, safety equipment and training to increase coverage, improve response times, expand fire prevention activities and provide greater access to emergency medical services.

The proposed \$21.17 million infrastructure bond would have designated \$14,358,000 to acquire land, designing, constructing and equipping a fifth fire station and a revolving equipment schedule buy in.

GFFR continues to review our delivery of services and seek out alternative funding opportunities to deliver effective emergency response to Great Falls.


