New Business: Community Policing Officer Clint Houston gave a brief overview of community activity and provided statistical data. The Spring Citizen Academy starts 2nd week in March on Thursdays. The fee is for the Master's Course fee is \$125 and proceeds go toward police officers school training.

Sandy Rice provided information on the Downtown Safety Alliance with a brief overview of mission and goals. She also provided handouts (attached). She talked about the Seasonal Community Patrol Volunteer program. The Downtown Safety Alliance meets at 9AM the first and third Tuesday of every month at NeighborWorks.

Committee Reports: – Nothing from City Commission and no information. Sandra gave an over from information provided by Harold Wheeler who was outgoing Police Advisory Board. Sandra reported that the major focus in November dealt with DDACTS; and recounted the successes of the Directed Enforcement Team program.

Sandra will provide a copy of the email from the City Traffic Supervisor to be filed with minutes. John Beer spoke with Jim Reardon with City Public Works and was told additional traffic studies will be done.

Jan Cahill, GFPS School Board Chairperson provided an overview of the GFPS Re-districting process. Demographics have changed since most of the schools were built 40 years ago. The Committee will make recommendations to the School Board and a decision will be made February 12th at PGMS at 5:30 PM.

Other Business: Jasmine Krotkov is a Legislative Candidate HD25 introduced herself and talked about her desire to run for office. (See attached flyer)

Currently a Traffic Signal is not a realistic solution for the vehicle delay that occurs for 1 hour only during the school year.

I indicated that I would move the crosswalk sign and mark the south leg of the intersection this school year. Unfortunately the weather and lack of materials will prevent me from doing this any time soon, but I will get it done.

We also discussed prohibiting parking on one or both sides of 38th Street near Lewis and Clark school. I am open to exploring this further but have not conducted any data collection or sought any more information concerning this. Thanks

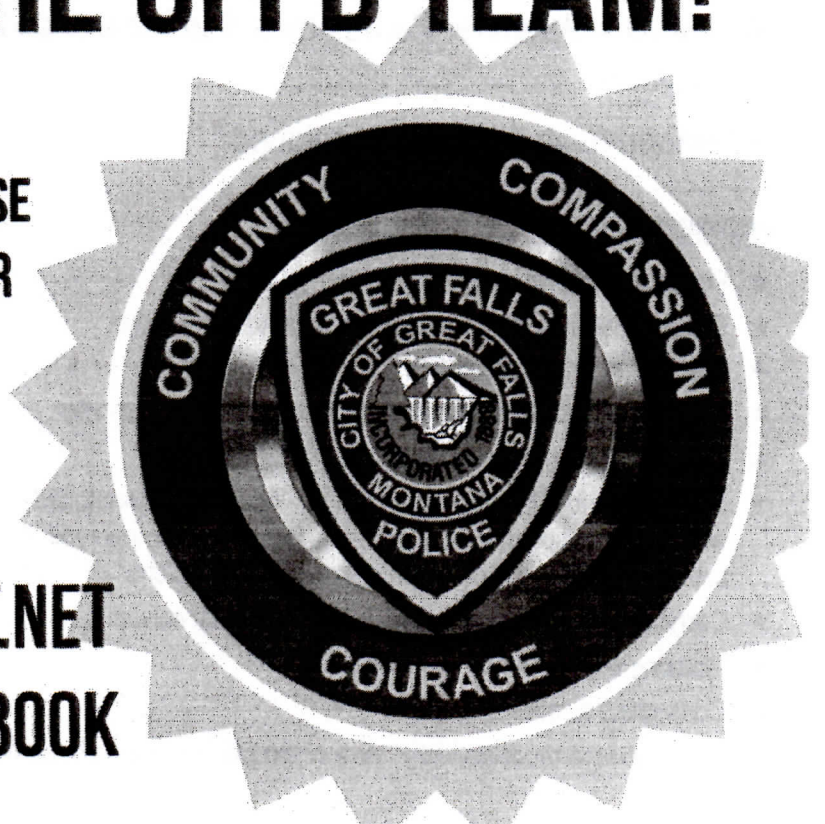

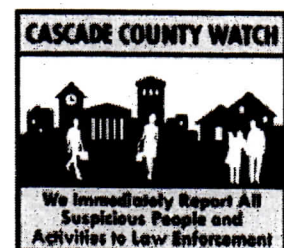
